WINERY REVIEW 2014 Paul Dahlenburg (nicknamed Bear), Lauretta Schulz (Laurie) and their children have leased a 2ha block of shiraz nlanted in the 1890s with rootlings supplied from France (doubtless grafted) in the wake of phylloxera's devastation of the Glenrowan and Rutherglen plantings. François de Castella (head of the Denartment of Agriculture) was foremost in the importation, but Lindemans (and one other) were also involved. Bear and Laurie knew about the origins of the vinevard which was in a state of serious decline after years of neglect. The owners of the vineyard were aware of its historic importance. and, while unwilling or unable to look after the vineyard

themselves, were more than

happy to lease it. Four years of trieless work in the vineyard, reconstructing the old vines, has finally resulted in tiny amounts of exceptionally good Shiraz. They have also planted a small area of nero d'Avola and durf. In the meantime they are purchasing small amounts of nero d'Avola from Glenrowan and durif from Rutherglen, allowing the release of tiny quantities of three wines.
